

Advanced Maternal Age Acog Guidelines

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Maternal age at either end of the reproductive age spectrum (less than 15 years and greater than 35 years) is an independent risk factor for stillbirth. Maternal age greater than or equal to 35 years of age is associated with an increased risk of stillbirth in nulliparous and multiparous women 25 26.

Background. Maternal mortality and severe maternal morbidity, particularly among women of color, have increased in the United States. The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) reported that pregnancy-related deaths increased from 7.2 per 100,000 live births in 1987 to 18.0 in 2014 1, and non-Hispanic black women had a 3.3 times greater pregnancy-related mortality ratio compared with ...

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Levels of Maternal Care | ACOG

Advanced maternal age is defined as age 35 years or above at delivery. Epidemiology/Incidence : About 15% of women giving birth in the US are 35 years or older, and 2.6% are age 40 or older. The risk of stillbirth in women age 35-39 is about 11-14/1,000 births and is 11-21/1,000 births in women 40 years and older.

For women > 40 years of age, the approximate risk of stillbirth at 40 weeks is 1:500 compared with women < 35 years who have a stillbirth risk of approximately 1:1000. This risk is comparable to women < 35 years of age at a gestation at 42 weeks' gestation.

CLINICAL POLICIES, PROCEDURES & GUIDELINES

ACOG has long established the standard of care for obstetric practice in the United States. Going back to the 1980's, ACOG issued guidelines recommending that women of advanced age be offered prenatal testing for Down syndrome and other aneuploidies. These guidelines remained in place until a new screening technology was recognized in the 2000's.

Advanced Maternal Age, or Pregnancy at Age 35 or Older. People who are pregnant at age 35 or older are often referred to as “advanced maternal age.” They may be told that they should have a labor induction or C-section at 39 weeks, solely because of their age.

advancing maternal age is associated with longer time to conceive 1; fecundability begins to decline in the early 30s; subfecundability typically becomes evident by mid-to-late 30s 1; progressive decrease in number and quality of oocytes from fetal life until menopause is the cause

Pregnancy in Women of Advanced Maternal Age

Pregnant women aged 35 years or older were divided into two advanced maternal age groups, 35–39 years and 40 years or older, and compared with pregnant women aged 20–34 years. Adverse pregnancy outcomes were chromosomal abnormalities, congenital malformations, miscarriage, stillbirth, and birth before 34 weeks of gestation.

Risk of Adverse Pregnancy Outcomes at Advanced Maternal Age

For the CMA/Karyotype group, the mean maternal age was 34.6 ± 5.0 years, and the mean gestational age was 17.1 weeks ± 4 weeks.
