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Eudaimonia (Greek: εὐδαιμονία [eudáimonia]); sometimes anglicized as eudaemonia or eudemonia, /j uː d ɪ ˈ m ə n i ə /) is a Greek word literally translating to the state or condition of 'good spirit', and which is commonly translated as 'happiness' or 'welfare'. In the works of Aristotle, eudaimonia was the term for the highest human good in older Greek tradition.
